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

## What else have we been up to? A message from our president, Tim Bittner:

The board of the Milton Historical Society is continually investing in the preservation of the Cameron House, and the artifacts of Milton's rich history.

Some of the work we performed on the Cameron House this year: We removed a tree which blew over in high winds and ended up against the house and on the roof. We also removed another tree to avoid possible future damage. We had the metal roof on the house painted, did numerous small odds & ends inside and outside, stoned the parking lot, replaced the fence timbers, and installed a mini-split AC/heat unit in the gallery for climate control and visitor's comfort. We're now installing another in our archives room upstairs to make that climate controlled.

### What's in Our Backyard? A history minute by Tim Bittner

Taking Airport Road alongside the Cameron House, directly behind the Cameron House property we first drive over what remains of the West Branch Canal prism. The original prism was 40' wide at the top of the water, 28' wide at the bottom, and had a water depth of 4'. The first commercial canal boat arrived in Milton in 1831 and the last one left in 1901.

Going a little farther east on Airport Road we would cross the Buffalo main line tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad, formerly the Sunbury and Erie Railroad and the Philadelphia and Erie Railroad. The first train on these tracks arrived in Milton in December 1854. In 1909, sixteen passenger trains stopped daily at the passenger station, now the Milton police station.

After crossing the railroad tracks, we would arrive at the Milton Airport. The airport existed for thirty years (1941-1971). Two planes and the Clemens were featured in our 2023 calendar for April. In a 1965 aerial photo I own, one large hanger and three smaller buildings are pictured. The airport consisted of a grass runway. In April 1943, members of the U.S. Army Air Force at Susquehanna University began flight training at Milton airport. The airport was selected for its smooth landing field and the openness of the location. Today it's the site of the Conagra warehouse complex.

Now you know what's in our backyard. Hope you enjoyed the trip back Airport Road!

#### The Lahr—Schrack Bible - contains surnames Lahr, Schrack, Dunkle, Pawling, Bordner



This Bible, recently donated by John Bower has ties not only to Milton but also to the Cameron House. It belonged to Nicholas C. Lahr, son of Paul & Mary Magdalena Lahr, born 5 Oct 1834, and wife Susanna Schrack, daughter of John S & Catherine Schrack. They married on 29 Oct 1861. A genealogist's treasure, the Bible also details the births, deaths, & marriages of their parents as well as their 5 children—and even the info of Nicholas's siblings!

I always say that when you dabble in genealogy, you realize how small the world is. It turns out that Nicholas & Susanna are the great grandparents of our long time board member, Deb Owens, who shared that they moved into the Cameron House as tenant farmers in 1861, shortly after James Cameron died in the Civil War.

#### Criteria for Donations to the Milton Historical Society

The Milton Historical Society is always grateful for the artifacts and items donated to us. However, due to space limitations for our archives, we must be selective of the items received and we must <u>reserve the right to use the item(s)</u> for the best use of the society.

The society will happily consider the following items:

- ✓ Documents, photographs, portraits, and artifacts with a direct connection to Milton and the surrounding area.
- ✓ Documents, photographs, portraits, and artifacts with a direct connection to the Cameron House and/or the Col. James Cameron family or other inhabitants of the Cameron House.
- ✓ Documents, photographs, portraits and artifacts with a direct connection to Governor James Pollock.
- ✓ Business ledgers and records related to Milton area businesses and industries.
- ✓ Advertising items and ephemera which represent Milton area businesses and industries.
- ✓ Products and furniture manufactured in Milton area businesses.
- ✓ Milton Area School District sports and school memorabilia including Orange & Black booklets (but no yearbooks please as they can be found at the Milton Public Library).
- ✓ Personal diaries of Milton area residents.
- ✓ Family Bibles of Milton area families. The society is particularly interested in copying genealogical data from area Bibles, even if the Bibles are retained by the family.
- ✓ Guns crafted by Milton area gunsmiths.
- ✓ Quilts and coverlets crafted in Milton area.

In view of our space limitations, we cannot accept some items. The following are things we will not generally accept - but may consider on a case by case basis:

- ✓ Records of clubs and organizations which are currently active. An exception may be made if our acceptance of such records is the only way to preserve them.
- ✓ Clothing, hats, uniforms.
- ✓ Military weapons after 1900. (Guns crafted earlier by Milton gunsmiths would be welcomed)
- ✓ Hymnals.
- ✓ Yearbooks from Milton Area High School. However, we will accept Orange and Black booklets from Milton School District.


